## Overview

Project Ready prepares African Americans and other historically underserved youth, grades 8 -12, for college and careers. The program features:

- Impactful local and national partnerships
- Innovative content
- Professional development
- Targeted events, activities and programs unique to the Urban League Movement

All Project Ready programs align with the educational and youth development principles outlined in the National Urban League's Project Ready 2.0 Curriculum and the Youth Development Framework & Guide, including the use of planning and activity templates designed to encourage and support intentional programming.

Through NYUL's Project Ready program, comprehensive academic and social-emotional services are provided to public high school students. Our education staff conducts 1:1 counseling sessions and leads enrichment activities for students, helping them build the skills vital to graduating high school, being ready to succeed in college, and beginning to learn about and consider potential career choices.

# Project Ready Mentor

### Overview

The Project Ready Mentor program is a vital initiative of the New York Urban League, aimed at empowering and guiding young individuals in their personal and professional development. The program pairs youth mentees with caring and committed adult mentors from the community and corporate partners.

We believe in the transformative power of mentorship and the profound impact it can have on the lives of our mentees. Through regular mentorship sessions, group activities, and community events, we created a supportive and nurturing environment that promotes growth, resilience, and empowerment.

Throughout the year, our program focused on creating impactful relationships, fostering personal growth, and providing unique experiential learning opportunities for students at Bronx Legacy High School. By leveraging the knowledge, experience, and support of our mentors, we equip mentees with the skills, resources, and confidence they need to achieve their goals and excel in their chosen paths.



Activity highlights included: Careers in Tech presentation which facilitated networking opportunities, allowing students to connect with mentors and establish relationships.

Martin Luther King, Jr. Day of Service project where participants came together to create care packages for donation to local students from Hostos Community College.

Mentor Mentee Night at Dave & Buster's which strengthened the bonds between mentors and mentees, creating a positive and supportive environment for ongoing mentorship and guidance.

# Whitney M. Young, Jr. Scholarship Program

### Overview

In 2025, the New York Urban League awarded a total of \$135,000 in scholarships to empower the next generation of leaders.



### Investment in Future Talent

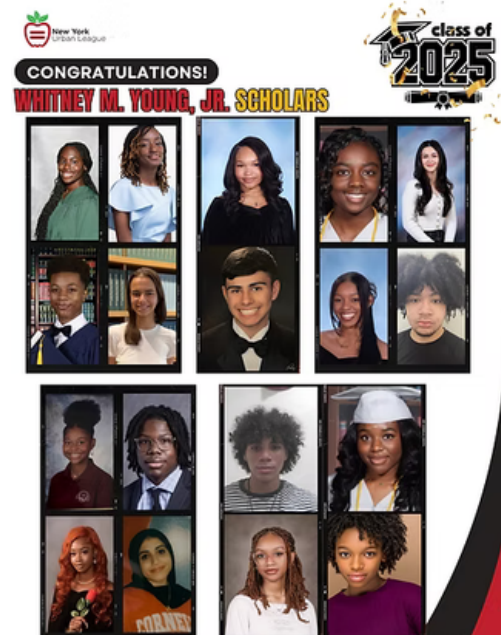
Our 2025 funding focused heavily on high-impact fields such as STEM and Business:

- **STEM Excellence:** Five scholars received the **NYPA (STEM) Scholarship** (\$10,000 each), and nine scholars were selected for the **inaugural NYUL x National Grid (STEM) Scholarship** (\$6,000 each).
- **Business & Leadership:** Two students received the **Deloitte (Business) Scholarship** (\$2,500 each) focusing on Finance and Business.
- **Community Advocacy:** Eight NYUL Scholarships (\$2,500 each) and three NYULYP Scholarships (\$2,000 each) were awarded to students pursuing disciplines ranging from Neuroscience and Engineering to Communications and Public Health.

### Academic Focus

Our scholars are entering the workforce of the future, with academic majors including Aerospace Engineering, Data Science, Biochemistry, Mechanical Engineering, and Finance. These initiatives underscore our ongoing commitment to ensuring STEM access and economic equity across New York City.

**Our Commitment: Everyone has access to jobs with sustainable living wages, good benefits and career advancement opportunities.**

Employment & Career Services is proud to close out the year with meaningful progress, expanded programming, and deeper engagement across the communities we serve. In 2025, our team supported 181 clients, offering job readiness assistance, career coaching, certification guidance, and tailored employment support. This year also marked our continued commitment to integrating technology and innovation into workforce development. From attending Mastercard’s Next Gen AI Prompt Engineering event to facilitating an engaging artificial intelligence workshop at Bronx Legacy High School, ECS remained focused on preparing job seekers and students for the future of work through hands-on learning and exposure to emerging skills.

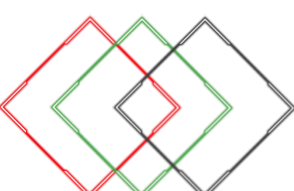

The Diversity & Inclusion Lab became the Equity Innovation Lab (EIL). This rebranding reflects our deepened commitment to not just discussing representation, but actively engineering equitable systems and innovative career pathways across New York’s most influential industries.



**Equity Innovation Year In Review**

**Scaling Impact & Industry Access**

The EIL began the year by launching "Equity Innovation Conversations" during Women’s History Month. In partnership with Chase Community Bank, we hosted an inaugural session featuring Lisa Price, Founder of Carol’s Daughter, who provided a masterclass in entrepreneurial resilience and the economic power of Black womanhood.

**Advocacy in Action: Health**

Recognizing that equity must extend to healthcare, the EIL collaborated with Fidelis Care and the Gentlemen’s Factory for the 3rd Annual Black Maternal Health event. This year’s summit expanded significantly, introducing Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc. as a partner and featuring dual panels that addressed the systemic inequities in maternal outcomes, right in the heart of Brooklyn.

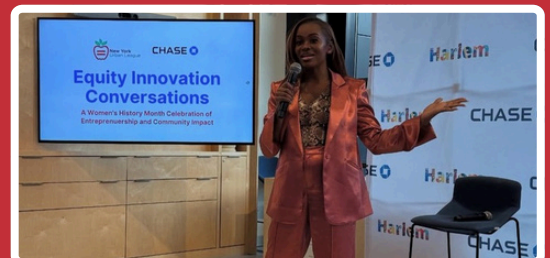

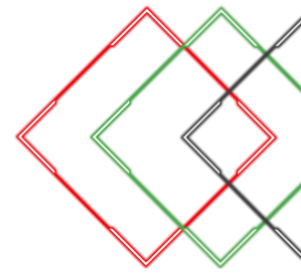

# Equity Innovation Lab

*From the fragrance labs to the AI hubs, the Equity Innovation Lab spent 2025 ensuring that "innovation" is synonymous with "inclusion" across every sector of the Empire State.*



### Scaling Impact & Industry Access

Building on our commitment to the next generation of leaders, the EIL deepened its partnership with The Fragrance Foundation to host the 2nd Annual Catalyst Career Empowerment event at Baruch College. This collaboration bridged the gap between higher education and the luxury sector, allowing nearly 100 students to engage in speed-networking with brands like L’Oreal and various fragrance houses. This event successfully solidified a long-term pipeline between Baruch’s diverse talent pool and the fragrance industry.



### Advocacy in Action: Technology

To close the year, the EIL leaned into the future of work. In a high-tech learning experience at the Mastercard Hub on 5th Avenue, we presented "Prompt Engineering for Everyone." This NYUL x Mastercard workforce skills experience demystified Artificial Intelligence for our community, ensuring that Black New Yorkers are not just consumers of AI, but the architects and engineers of the new digital economy.

# Small Business SOLUTIONS Center

### Empowering Entrepreneurs. Building Communities

- The NYUL Small Business Solutions Center (SBSC) empowers entrepreneurs across Greater New York City and beyond.
- Guided by a local-first, global-thinking approach, we connect business owners to essential resources and opportunities.
- SBSC strengthens entrepreneurial ecosystems through one-on-one consulting, technical assistance, workshops, and events.
- Our work supports sustainable small businesses and inclusive economic growth in the communities we serve.



In 2025, the NYUL Small Business SOLUTIONS Center (SBSC) solidified its role as a premier engine for equitable economic growth across all five boroughs. By blending rigorous technical assistance with cultural intentionality, the Center empowered a diverse cohort of emerging and seasoned entrepreneurs to scale their ventures, secure capital, and navigate the complexities of the New York marketplace.

### Core Pillars of Impact

- **Incubation & Mastery:** The flagship Black Business Matters Business Plan Incubator served as the year's cornerstone. Out of an initial pool of competitive candidates, 22 businesses successfully completed the intensive 12-week curriculum, emerging with fundable, execution-ready business plans prepared for the 2026 fiscal landscape.
- **Capital Access & Financial Growth:** We bridged the "capital gap" by facilitating over \$40,000 in direct financial support. This included \$25,000 in grants and prizes—bolstered by partners like UPS, TD Bank, and the UP Foundation—and a \$15,000 pass-through grant to Stapledon Arts, proving that education is most effective when paired with tangible resources.
- **Strategic Programming & MWBE Access:** From the 3rd Annual Pitch Black Competition to specialized MWBE certification workshops featuring NYS and NYC officials, SBSC provided entrepreneurs with the "Game Plan" necessary for procurement and contracting.
- **Community-Centered Innovation:** We expanded our footprint through 3rd Space Sessions, a new series at the intersection of commerce and culture, and hosted "She Works Hard for the Money," an intimate high-touch dinner connecting 40 women entrepreneurs directly with experts in Law, Retail, and Public Relations.

For the eleventh consecutive year, the New York Urban League is committed to co-administering the Communities of Color Nonprofit Stabilization Fund, providing awards to nonprofits across the five boroughs of NYC.

In 2025, the New York City Council allocated \$3.755 million to support this endeavor, of which NYUL was awarded \$1.3 million.

# Communities of Color Nonprofit Stabilization Fund



## Overview

In 2014, the New York Urban League, Hispanic Federation, Coalition for Asian American Children and Families, and Asian American Federation formed an alliance to provide capacity-building support to Black, Latino, and Asian-led community-based organizations throughout New York City's five boroughs.



CCNSF funding has supported TONYC in the process of transitioning toward codified shared leadership practices. Through partnerships with external consultants that CCNSF helped make possible, our staff has had the opportunity to train in shared accountability and decision making, and we have begun to develop the onboarding materials for new members. Long term, this will help ensure that our value of prioritizing the interests and needs of those most affected by systemic oppression is upheld not just in our culture, but in our organizational structure as well.

**Theater of the Oppressed**



Capacity-building support is crucial, especially as we expand our programs. The funding has been instrumental in helping us build our infrastructure, ensuring our programs operate efficiently, and enabling us to serve more girls. This support has allowed us to enhance our organizational capacity, implement robust operational systems, and expand our reach, ultimately empowering more young women to pursue careers in STEM.

With the support of the CCNSF we were able to accelerate our grant application process, build supporting multi-media collateral, and do outreach to the press. In this time we applied for ten grants and have already won three of them, securing over \$300,000 in additional funding over the next three years.

**Stem From Dance**



Because of CCNSF's support, *Girl Be Heard* has been able to conduct a much-needed overhaul and refresh our 10-year strong arts education curriculum and program design into a unique teaching pedagogy we call *Leadership as Ensemble*. The *Leadership as Ensemble* approach harnesses the power of the collective, centering the unique needs of young people of color to empower hundreds of NYC girls to become artist-activists and changemakers by using artistry to lend their collective voices and knowledge to solving systemic issues facing girls of color today. Through creating art, we build leaders that advocate for justice and equitable systems for themselves and their communities.

# Partnership Highlights

### THE POWER OF PARTNERSHIP: AIRBNB & NYUL

In 2025, we launched a transformative, broad-reaching partnership with Airbnb. Their \$130,000 in operating support fueled our most vital initiatives, from the HBCU College Tour and Fair to our inaugural Equity Summit and the Frederick Douglass Awards Dinner.

### Institutional Impact & Grants

- **KeyBank Impact Grant:** A commitment of \$100,000 per year for three years is allowing us to provide critical support services to students at Bronx Legacy High School. We are also extending college and career-readiness services to families at both Bronx Legacy and Careers in Sports High School.
- **Empowering Black Communities (City Grant):** With a \$100,000 award, NYUL is fostering the next generation of leaders through civic engagement workshops and a new, culturally responsive curriculum tailored to the Black experience.
- **NYSBLT Fiscal Conduit (State Grant):** NYUL was honored to be one of five nonprofits selected to help distribute \$30 million in state funding. In partnership with the New York State Black Legislative Task Force, we are ensuring these resources reach organizations tackling disparities in health, education, and economic security.

### Signature Events: Record-Breaking Results

- **Frederick Douglass Awards Dinner (FDD):** We raised a staggering \$805,000—a 37% increase over 2024. We were proud to honor trailblazers Alvin Bragg, Tina Byles Williams, and Liz Neumark.
- **HBCU Fair:** Support for the next generation of scholars grew by 40%, with \$163,500 raised from seven corporate partners, including two new supporters.
- **Equity Summit:** On April 15 (Jackie Robinson Day), we partnered with the New York Yankees at Yankee Stadium to host a landmark summit focused on actionable solutions for civil rights and equity.

In 2025, the New York Urban League's Town Hall series served as a vital platform for civic engagement, bringing together national experts, local leaders, and community members to address the most pressing issues of our time. From the macroeconomic shifts of the "State of Black America" to the granular needs of NYC public schools, these convenings turned dialogue into a strategic roadmap for the next two years.

### OUR KIDS, OUR FUTURE: A FOCUS ON PUBLIC EDUCATION

This robust "Education Town Hall" convened community members with former NYC Schools Chancellor Dr. Meisha Porter and Lurie Daniel Favors (Center for Law & Social Justice) to move beyond standardized metrics and toward a human-centered educational model.

- **Empowering the Ecosystem:** Participants called for redefining "successful education" by empowering parents as community organizers and integrating intergenerational wisdom into the classroom
- **Civic Influence:** The session served as a catalyst for translating civic engagement into sustained national and local influence, ensuring community voices drive the policy agenda.

### THE STATE OF BLACK AMERICA

Led by NYUL President & CEO Arva Rice and Professor Basil Smikle, this critical leadership discussion addressed the complex political landscape, specifically the implications of Project 2025 and new executive orders.

- **A Call to Action:** The session highlighted that resilience is rooted in community-led initiatives, mutual aid, and intentional youth support.
- **The Path Forward:** The conversation focused on translating "Economic Uncertainty" into a unified strategy for institutional strength and collective action.

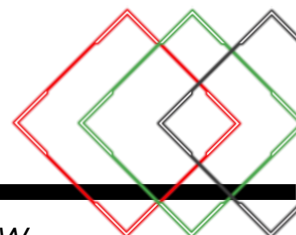
# Center for Black Excellence Speaker Series
